All permissions relating to visiting, receiving, automobiling, ball games, entertainments outside of the college campus, must be given by the Dean.

Students may attend the church of their choice, but must remain for both Sunday School and church.

Students will not ride into town with men unless they are on approved list in college office.

Students who go home for week-ends with young men must have written permission from parents to Dean.

To change churches, permission must be obtained from President of the Student Body.

NOTE—The following privileges are not subject to change nor can their number be increased at any time during the year.

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### SENIOR PRIVILEGES

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1. Two Seniors attend show without chaperon.

2. Four Seniors attend picture show on Saturday night, provided their return is not later than 10:00 p. m.

3. Two Seniors in town at any time during the day, provided class attendance is not interfered with.

4. Senior day students permitted to visit in the dormitories.

5. Seniors to speak for a minute with out-of-town men whom they may meet on the street.

6. Seniors may be seen in company with young men when spending the week-end in town, provided the hostess accompanies them.

7. Seniors spend the day in town with friends, provided the Dean be notified by the Seniors receiving invitations as to when and where the day is to be spent.

8. Seniors, in groups of two, may walk off the campus after quiet hour on Sunday, provided that not more than 50 per cent of Seniors are off the campus at the same time.

9. Seniors may spend as many week-ends away as desired, provided class work is kept up.

10. Seniors may have guests other than alumnae, provided that in each instance arrangements be made in the office before the arrival of guests.

11. Seniors may chaperon under-classmen, provided the group so chaperoned is limited to five, and the return is on time for dinner.

12. Seniors have their choice in attending church.

13. Seniors permitted to have men callers twice each week, on Tuesday and Saturday evenings. Any Senior wishing to do so may substitute for the Tuesday evening caller either (1) a dinner invitation or (2) a show or play.

14. Seniors permitted to remain off the campus on Sunday until 9:00 p. m., provided that not more than 50 per cent be away at the same time, and that at least one of the three highest officers of Student Government be among those who remain on the campus.

15. Seniors permitted to absent themselves from meals at any time.

16. Seniors receiving invitations at church for dinner are permitted to accept, provided some one "signs up" for them.

17. Seniors are permitted the use of the telephone at any time.

18. Seniors are permitted to keep lights on until 11:00 p. m., but are to be in their rooms after 10:30, and quiet.

19. Seniors doing "credit" work are exempt from examinations.

20. One Senior may chaperon four under-classmen to the picture show on Saturday night provided their return is not later than ten p. m.

21. One Senior may chaperon four girls to ball game.

22. Seniors after receiving a major, lose their privileges for one week. Any member of this class having lost privileges for six times prove by this insubordination that she is out of sympathy with the administration and student council and will be automatically excluded from the student body.

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### JUNIOR PRIVILEGES

1. Two Juniors to town unchaperoned.
2. Two Juniors attend picture show.
3. Junior chaperon not less than two or more than five to "little store" and to walk.
4. Junior chaperon to town provided the group be limited to four, the chaperon to make the fourth.
5. Junior attend same Sunday School every week, but may go with Senior to another church for her church services.
6. Junior away for two week-ends each calendar month with exception of September and January.
7. Junior leaves campus at any time during the school day, provided such absence does not interfere with class attendance, and that she be accompanied by another Junior or by a Senior.
8. Speak to unexpected callers after classes, provided the callers are not received in dormitory, and that they do not include young men.
9. One meal cut each day.
10. Juniors entering from other colleges will be granted privileges at the end of the first quarter.
11. That one Junior may chaperon a group of girls to the picture show.

12. Juniors leaving for the week-end may be allowed to leave Saturday as soon as their last class is finished.

13. That Juniors be allowed to be chaperoned by Seniors to Davidson for ball games. (This means a direct trip to Davidson and an immediate return to the college after the game.)

14. Juniors after receiving a major lose their privileges for one week. Any member of this class having lost privileges for six times prove by this insubordination that she is out of sympathy with the administration and student council and will be automatically excluded from the student body.

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### SOPHOMORE PRIVILEGES

1. That two Sophomores be allowed to go to "little store" alone.
2. That Sophomores attend the same Sunday School each week, but be allowed to go once a month with a Senior to some other church service.
3. That Sophomores be allowed to make athletic points on campus any time after 2:30 p. m.
4. That one Sophomore be allowed to chaperon to "little store."
5. That one Sophomore be allowed to chaperon to walk in Myers Park.
6. Sophomores entering from other colleges will be granted privileges at the end of the first semester.
7. Two Sophomores to town unchaperoned, but not allowed in drug stores.
8. Sophomores and Freshman to town any afternoon. Any two afternoons at any hour which does not interfere with their class work.
9. Three Sophomores may attend the picture show together.
10. Sophomores may be absent from meals three times a week.
11. Any Sophomore after receiving one major loses her privilege for one week.

## TELEPHONE REGULATIONS

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Any posted telephone call may be answered at any time during day, provided it does not interfere with class work. No telephone hours on Sunday.

No student, excepting Seniors, may receive telephone calls during Study Hall.

Day students will not receive long distance calls.

Long distance messages may not be sent except by special permission (Seniors excepted). No student may reverse a call. All calls are to be paid for in Secretary's office.

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## LIBRARY RULES

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I. The Library is a place for research and reading and NOT for lesson preparation. Day students will use their study hall for the latter purpose.

II. Group conversations are not permitted. Points will be given for any such misconduct.

III. Fiction for week-end reading may be checked out only on Saturday morning. Reference books taken out for the week-end must be registered in Librarian's book and returned before 8:30 on Monday morning. Fines are imposed for this violation as well as for books overdue. Reference books placed on the Librarian's desk must be registered in the user's name. On no account are these books to be taken from the Library during the week.

IV. All books save Fiction and Encyclopedias should be returned to the shelf they are taken from. Encyclopedias should be placed in consecutive order.

V. Magazines and newspapers are not to be taken from the table or rack and are not to be clipped. Do not ask for this permission.

VI. Library scholarship girls are responsible for notices posted by the Librarian on the Library bulletin board.

VII. The Library will be closed on Saturday afternoon at 4:00 o'clock.

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## REGULATIONS FOR LOCAL STUDENTS

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I. (a) A comfortable room has been provided for the use of local students, and, with the exception of Seniors, all local students will remain in this room during such time as they are not in recitation, the conduct of each to be such as not to interfere with the work of others. (In pleasant weather, the campus may be substituted for the study hall).

(b) There is to be no loitering in any of the several buildings. Bells ring for change of classes, and there is ample time to reach any class room promptly after the bell begins to ring. Visiting in dormitories except with permission of the Dean is forbidden at all times.

(c) All hats, wraps, or other articles belonging to local students are to be left either in the "Day Students' Study Hall," or on the hooks just outside.

(d) **Throughout school hours quiet is to be maintained on the campus.** Recitations are in progress; and are not to be disturbed.

(e) All local students are required to attend chapel services on Tuesday, and other days if they are on the campus at 12:30.

II. Points will be given for violations of these regulations. These points will be placed on reports sent to parents. Any student who shows herself wilfully neglectful of these regulations will be asked to withdraw from the school.

Marshals

The Junior making the highest scholastic average for three years shall be chief marshal; the two Juniors making next highest, the two Sophomores who average highest for two years and the Freshman averaging highest for one year shall serve as commencement marshals.

They shall usher for class day exercises and for graduation exercises. They shall wear the colors of the graduating class.

TRADITIONS

The Freshman and Junior classes are sister classes, while the Sophomores and Seniors stand united at all times in events demanding class spirit. Generally, some social courtesies are rendered to upper-class girls by lower-classmen.

Queens College colors are light blue and dark blue, and our motto, "*Nisi dominus est frustra.*" The entering class always takes the colors, motto and flower of the class which was graduated the previous June.

On Class Day, during commencement week, the Juniors carry a daisy chain and receive the caps and gowns which are the exclusive property of the Senior Class. After receiving these the Junior Class enjoys its annual dinner in the city.

Everyone stands during the singing of "Alma Mater."

The Edelweiss is published by the Senior Class, while the Queens Blues is published by the Junior Class.

Seniors wear their caps and gowns and act as ushers on May Day.

Juniors serve at the Alumnae Banquet.

"O Mother Dear, Jerusalem," and "Ancient of Days," are always sung as the Processional and Recessional at the Baccalaureate Sermon.

The Seniors give the Sophomores a breakfast Class Day.

The Senior Class, upon leaving, always leaves some gift to the College.

The Sophomores decorate the stage for Class Day Exercises.

BE SURE

1. To join the Young Women's Christian Association at your first opportunity after your arrival.
2. To read the College Catalogue, to bring it with you when you come to college and to keep it for reference.
3. To register early.
4. To watch the bulletin board.
5. To decide on your course and make out your schedule of recitations as early as possible.
6. To call on old students for necessary help.
7. To go to all class meetings when they are called.
8. To attend all meetings of the student body.
9. To report promptly to chapel on hearing the bell.
10. To join the Athletic Association.
11. To buy an Annual.
12. To keep the handbook during the year. You will have occasion to refer to it often.
13. To learn the Student Government rules in this handbook. Ignorance of the law is no excuse for its violation.
